An Optical Network Unit (ONU) converts optical signals from the fiber line into electrical signals that devices can use. While some advanced ONUs may include basic routing features, their main function is signal conversion and connectivity, not full network routing . A fiber router, on the other hand, is specifically designed to work with fiber internet. It connects to an ONU or has an integrated ONU, and it performs all the functions of a traditional router:

- o Routing data packets between devices and the internet
- o Managing IP addresses and NAT
- o Providing Wi-Fi access
- o Implementing security features like firewalls

Practical Setup

In a typical home fiber setup:

- o Fiber line from ISP -> connects to an ONT/ONU
- o ONU -> converts optical signals to Ethernet
- o Fiber router -> connects to the ONU via Ethernet or SFP+ module, then distributes internet to devices Some modern routers with SFP+ ports can directly interface with fiber modules, effectively replacing a separate ONU in certain setups, but the router itself is still required to handle network management .
