- o Use Cable Management Accessories: Incorporate D-rings, brush panels, and horizontal managers to guide cables and reduce strain at connection points .
- o Label and Color-Code: Clearly label both ends of each cable and use color coding to identify functions or network segments, simplifying maintenance and troubleshooting .
- o Secure Cables: Bundle cables with Velcro straps rather than zip ties to allow flexibility and prevent crushing .

Testing and Maintenance

After installation, test all connections to ensure signal integrity and proper network performance . Regularly inspect trays for overloaded cables, dust accumulation, or airflow obstruction. Adjust routing as new equipment is added to maintain a clean and efficient system .
